#### What happened to the Drug house on the Corner?"

The Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods (SCAN) Act is improving community safety by targeting and, if necessary, shutting down residential and commercial buildings that are regularly used for illegal activities such as producing, selling or using illegal drugs, prostitution, solvent abuse or the unlawful sale and consumption of alcohol.

"On any block and in any neighbour-hood, it only takes one house that is harbouring illegal activities to undermine the safety of all residents of that community and affect the property values throughout that neighbour-hood," said Justice Minister Frank Quennell.

The Act also creates a process where building fortifications that cause public safety concerns and/or exceed reasonable security measures for residential or commercial dwellings can be removed by police. These fortifications may also prevent emergency response personnel, law enforcement officials, or occupants from gaining access to or escaping from those buildings in an Fortifications often emergency. include bullet proof glass or explosive-resistant materials, barbed wire, armour to reinforce doors, and bars on windows or doors.

This legislation empowers citizens to take back their neighbourhoods by confidentially reporting problem residences and businesses. It will also hold property owners accountable for threatening or disturbing activities regularly taking place on their property.

In its first 11 months of operation, the Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods Investigation Unit has received 305 complaints. Of those complaints, 94 properties where illegal activities

were occurring have been shut down.

## What should I look for in my neighbourhood?

The following is a list of common signs of illegal activity. Alone, any of these activities or signs may not necessarily mean that drug dealing, drug pro-

ducing, substance abuse, prostitution or any variety of other illegal activities are occurring on a property. However, a frequency of the following list of activities or a combination of them occurring on a property may indicate a problem:

- Frequent visitors at all times of the day and night
- Frequent late night activity
- Windows blackened or curtains always drawn

- ✓ Visitors with expensive vehicles
- Unfriendly people who appear to be secretive about their activities
- People watching cars suspiciously as they pass by
- Extensive investment in home security
- ✓ Strange odours coming from the house or garbage
- Garbage that contains numerous bottles and containers, particularly chemical containers
- Putting garbage out in another neighbours' collection area

If you are suspicious of a property in your neighbourhood, do not investigate it yourself or approach the occupants. Please call the Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods Investigation Unit immediately at 1-866-51-SAFER. Sitting at home you sometimes wonder, "what is happening in the neighbourhood?"

At the North

Central office we have 40 to 50 inquiries a day for information and services in the community.

We are a referral agency for the Food Bank and also a depot for the Good Food Box. On Mondays the Mobile R Store sets up across the hall and people from all over the neighbourhood come to buy fresh fruits and vegetables.

On Tuesday we host the seniors Care & Share Luncheon and have a Walking Club every Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning.

For the next 2 months we will run the largest tax clinic in the city to help people on low income prepare their taxes. We will be working with 4 staff and over 15 volunteers.

We are gearing up this summer for another youth training program, which cut enough grass last summer to cover Taylor Field twice!

This summer we are again getting ready for another community cleanup. Last year we had close to 60 volunteers and can always use more.

The secret to all our success and accomplishments is the number of volunteers we are getting in North Central to come out and give a hand. If you think you have some spare time, or if there is something that is of interest to you please give us a call because your community can use you.

#### **Regina Inner City Community Partnership Update**

hree years ago Regina North Central residents participated in a survey to determine: what the community **prides itself** on; what the community **wants** for its future; and what the community **needs** in order to realize its goals.

The Regina Inner City Community Partnership (RICCP) was formed in 2002 to assist the community in addressing the longstanding issues and challenges that were identified in the survey. The main focus of the RICCP is to enhance the impact of activities through collaboration and through the removal of operational, policy, regulation and legislative barriers that slow down action to the community vision and priorities.

The year 2005 was very busy in Regina North Central with the implementation of various activities and initiatives in the areas of: housing and infrastructure; employment; and crime and safety. On December 17, 2005, the RICCP presented a report to the community, *Making a Difference in North Central*, which outlined some successes and achievements in the priority areas, some of which are:

- \*\* For housing and infrastructure, the first major residential construction in 10 years is currently under way with 35 new homes at various stages of construction
- \* The North Central Housing Education Committee has been providing information and support to homeowners and renters

- \* In the area of crime and safety, neighbourhood safety is being addressed through programs such as Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) facilitated by the North Central Community Association
- \* A Housing Enforcement Task

- \* In the area of employment, the North Central Employment Enhancement Program, another Community Association project, is helping young people find and keep stable employment

#### **Police Service Centre Changes**

The Regina Police Service has strived over the years to increase the efficiency and effectiveness of the Service Centres for the communities in which they serve and for the other members of the Regina Police Service. The Service Centres were established to deal with long-term problems faced by the communities in which they are located. Members working out of the Service Centres are not normally dispatched to deal with emergent calls for service. Service Centre members take proactive approaches to long-term problems to either eliminate or reduce the problems in the communities.

The New Year brought changes to the North Central and Al Ritchie Service Centres that will allow for more uniformed members to be visible within the community. One uniformed member used to staff the front desk of each Service Centre for a 12-hour period. At times, the number of people attending to the Centres was minimal and member's time could be better utilized working on the streets to deal with ongoing problems.

As of mid-January, 2006, the Service Centres' front desk hours were changed to Monday to Thursday 10:00 am to 2:00 pm and will be closed on Saturday, Sunday and all statutory holidays. Members will still work out of the Centres during other times of the week. This will not mean that you will be unable to obtain the services of a police officer if they are not at the Service Centre. A phone system will be installed outside each Service Centre that will allow people to contact members directly to report non-emergent calls Monday to Thursday between the hours of 10:00 am to 6:00 pm. All emergency calls should be directed to our Headquarters Building by calling 9-1-1.

The changes may cause some difficulties for residents in the areas but overall will allow more people living in North Central and Al Ritchie a greater opportunity to have face-to-face contact with Service Centre members. If anyone has any questions or comments on the changes they can call me, S/Sgt. Dave Wyatt at (306) 777-6464, during normal business hours.

North Central has been selected as one of the first neighbourhoods in the Regina Qu'Appelle Health Region in which to improve access to primary health care services for the community. Primary health care is the first level of contact with the health system and includes services to promote health, prevent illnesses, care for common illnesses and manage ongoing health problems. It includes primary care services from a family physiresidents, service cian or a nurse practitioner, a population providers and health and public health focus on healthy care providers. lifestyles and disease prevention, and betdeveloped the ter management of chronic conditions like diabetes or asthma. All the health providers work together in a team approach to provide services to the community.

In June 2005, a Plan for Primary Health Care in North Central was presented to the RQHR by the North Central Consultation Committee. The Committee, made up of residents, service providers and health care providers,


developed the plan. The Plan was then taken forward to Saskatchewan Health by ROHR. Saskatchewan Health has been very impressed with the depth of the report and its strategies to move forward.

> One of the key strategies of the report was to improve access to primary health care services by enhancing the primary health care team. The current focus for the region has been working in partnership with the University of Saskatchewan's College of Medicine Family Medicine Unit to secure a full time physician who would be part of the Four Directions Community Health Centre. Other efforts to enhance the team are underway.

The RQHR will continue to work with the North Central Primary Health Care Consultation Committee to ensure a strong community voice in the development and delivery of primary health care in the neighbourhood. Future plans include a network of primary health care sites around the region in both the rural and urban areas.


## Seniors Walking Club Monday, Wednesday & Friday 8:00 to 9:00 a.m.

## M.P. Report

I would like to thank all the voters of Regina-Qu'Appelle for coming out to vote on January 23rd. I am very honoured and thankful that voters here chose me to represent this riding again in the upcoming Parliament. Being part of a new government is exciting and I am confident that residents of Regina will be very pleased by the policies and actions taken by the Conservative government.



Our number one priority as a government, and the first piece of legislation that will be put before the House of Commons, is the Federal Accountability Act. Get involved is the new catch phrase in North Central because in so many ways, personal involvement IS the key to a successful community!

Get involved with our upcoming Community Spring Clean-up, June 24<sup>th</sup>. If you want to help, contact the North Central Community Association at 791-9888 to be placed on a contact list. The Association will contact and inform you of the next clean-up schedule.

Get involved and support the City of Regina's Waste Minimization Program. What can one person do? A lot. Reduce the amount of trash YOU generate. Consider taking a travel mug to get your morning coffee; you'll save the environment from one more disposable cup and will keep your beverage hot longer. Just think of the difference we can make if everyone did that! Take your recyclables to one of the many Big Blue Bin locations across the city (North Central location at the Field House). When the landfill reaches capacity, it creates a big expense that we, as citizens of Regina, will have to help pay for through property taxes. It costs about \$20 million to close our landfill and open a new one.

Speaking of taxes, City Council is reviewing all the options to budget the 2006 tax year. Many communities in Saskatchewan were considering about a six per cent increase to continue to offer services we have come to enjoy. However, a recent announcement by the Saskatchewan Provincial Government states that they will provide additional revenue to the City of Regina. At the time of my writing this newsletter, it is unclear what impact this will have on our city mill rate, but I am

optimistic it will assist in my promise to keep our tax increases at bay.

Talks are on-going to develop a new grocery centre in North Central. Also promising, is the approval of 14 new infill homes to be built here using local contractors. Also, preliminary plan-

ning continues at the Regina Exhibition Grounds for renovation and for possible building additions.

Some of the reasons why we are seeing improvement in North Central are due to the dedication and hard work provided by our Housing Standards Enforcement Team. 

#### **Home Security Checklist**

Complete this security check to find out if your home may be vulnerable to thieves.

#### **DOORS**

- Doors have 180° peepholes
- Inside locks are at least one metre from glass
- Exterior doors are solid-core
- Exterior doors have 2.5 cm (1") deadbolts
- Exterior door hinge pins are non-removable
- Door jambs are securely fastened
- Strike plates are secured to door jambs with 6.35 cm (2.5") screws
- Deadbolts extend sufficiently into strike plates
- Locks have been changed or re-keyed since you have moved in

#### **WINDOWS**

- Double-hung windows are securely pinned
- Metal windows & basement windows have auxiliary locks

- Curtains cover windows completely
- Window air conditioners are secured from inside

#### **GARAGE**

- Garage door closes tightly
- Overhead garage door has quality lock
- Doors are locked and closed when not in use
- Remote garage door opener is customized for your garage door
- Keys are removed from vehicle while it's in the garage
- Garage light can be turned on from inside the house

#### **EXTERIORS**

- Shrubs are cut below window level
- \_ Tree limbs are cut above window level
- Residence number is visible from the street, and at night all entrances to the house and garage are well lit
