

NORTH CENTRAL INNER CITY YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

f you see several youth in the North Central and Core area of Regina wearing bright red and yellow vests, cutting grass, trimming weeds, cleaning up garbage, and assisting residents in making a visible improvement in their communities, they are not city workers. They are this year's participants in the North Central Inner City Youth Employment Program. We are currently in the second year of the program building on the success of last year's North Central Employment Enhancement Project. Our program has been expanded considerably, and this year we are including the Core Community as part of our Community Work initiative.

The North Central Inner City Youth Employment Program began on May 8, 2006, and will run until April 30, 2007. This year we will have two intakes of twenty youth, ages 18-29. The first started on May 8, 2006, and the second intake will be July 4, 2006. The youth will be working in the community from May 15 to August 30 with two work crews, one in North Central, and one in Core. Each crew will consist of one supervisor and five participants. After the second intake, the work crew will number fifteen participants. The types of services and activities that we will be providing this year include grass cutting, weed trimming, demolition of small buildings, yard cleanup, cutting tree branches, garden work, painting (fences, garages, small buildings), minor exterior repair (fences, steps), maintenance of vacant lots, setting up/assisting for community events, and needle cleanup.

The participants will also be developing communication skills, job readiness, and career exploration in our Personal Development Classes. The program offers training components in an Introduction to Trades, and Introduction to Computers. After completing the training components, the participants will gain valuable on the job experience through work placements. This year we will also include a Health and Wellness component that will be ongoing throughout the program. Participants will have the opportunity to take part in fitness activities and seminars promoting positive life choices, in order to improve their health, well-being, and employment opportunities. Participants will be touring several organizations and businesses throughout Regina to broaden their view of employment possibilities, and to gain an understanding of the nature of employment positions.



- *Inner City Youth Employment Program* an initiative through the work of the EDS that hires up to 40 youth to work on the CPTED recommendations and take on the physical work of changing the environment as it relates to crime. Cleaning graffiti, cutting weeds, mowing laws in common areas and cleaning up of vacant and abandoned properties. The result is on the job training with the goal of being fully employed at the end of the program
- *Employment Centre* through recommendations of the EDS committee, begin to work with government, skills development groups and local business to develop a comprehensive employment centre for North Central.
- *Albert Library* a self-sustainable committee of NCCA that oversees and manages the community library. One of the first locally run libraries in the province of Saskatchewan
- Community Clean Up works with residents and community agencies to clean up neighbourhood bi-annually
- CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) A community strategy to reduce the incidence of crime
- *Hire Your Neighbour Program* an offshoot of the CPTED work in getting neighbours to help neighbours with home repairs, maintenance etc.
- *Together Now Inter-Agency Forum* over 30 agencies working in North Central to share ideas and resources; meets 4 times a year throughout the community
- *Social Enterprise* an initiative to bring together NC businesses and begin to develop economic and development policy and programs
- *Care and Share* a committee supported by the association that deals with seniors' health and welfare and offers weekly luncheons

After meeting at City Hall, His Honour, Mayor Pat Fiacco led Her Excellency on a walking tour, discussing the both the needs and aspirations of the community. Mayor Fiacco took pride in showing her a number of new developments, and showing her ways in which our community is taking charge of itself – including the number of fine agencies as well as a number of houses being built and renovated.

Her Excellency was impressed by the community spirit she witnessed, and approved of the many positive changes happening within North Central. Speaking to a crowd gathered at North Central Family Centre, she was reminded of her own childhood and humble beginnings, living in cramped housing. Because she could relate to our community members, she was even more impressed by the measures we have taken as a community in improving the living situations, and in increasing the number of services available to our families and children.

Michaëlle Jean was Installed as the Governor General of Canada on September 27, 2005. Jean came to Canada as a refugee from Haiti in 1968. She obtained both a B.A. and Master of Arts Degrees at the University of Montreal. After spending more than seven years working in shelters for battered women, she became involved in journalism through a number of shows on Radio Canada, and later on CBC Newsworld and a number of shows since.

Congratulations Tom; we're very proud of you!




It's Finally Here! Community Clean Up

Income Tax Program a Huge Success!



Another new house being built in North Central. The list is close to 30 new housing starts in the area in the last year.






AWARENESSDAY JUNE 21, 2006

Ehrlo Basketball is back in North Central for the third year in a row! Operating out of Scott Collegiate, the Eastview Community Centre, and the Glencairn Neighbourhood Recreation Centre, the North Central Zone (Scott) is the largest of the three with over 50 youth participating only two weeks into the season!

The league offers pick-up type games at no cost, one night per week at each facility, in two age divisions: junior (youth aged 8 – 12) and senior (youth aged 13 – 16). At Scott Collegiate the junior division plays for the first half of the evening from $6:00 - 7:30^{\text{pm}}$, and the seniors for the second half from $7:30 - 9:00^{\text{pm}}$. Games are run by volunteers who do the scorekeeping and refereing, and more volunteers from the community and beyond are always welcome.

NCCA is happy to announce that we are rolling out an improved Bicycle Licensing program! As of August, 2004, NCCA has been administering the program for the City of Regina.

Why should you license your Bike? THEFT PREVENTION & RECOVERY – having a bike license increases the chances of having your bike returned to you, if it is stolen

ACCIDENT VICTIM IDENTIFICATION – Provides a means of identifying accident victims, especially children, who usually carry no form of identification

MONEY FOR BIKE PROGRAMS – license revenue is reinvested into the community to support a comprehensive bicycle recovery program

IT'S INEXPENSIVE – new licenses cost only \$5, and there is no annual renewal fee. Licenses are valid for as long as you own the bike – and the license c an be transferred to a new owner for only \$2!

IT'S EASY – licenses are available at City Hall, and right here at North Central Community Association at Albert Scott. We've also partnered with several Regina retailers – you can buy your license at the same time that you buy a bike!

IT'S THE LAW! – every bike in Regina is required by law to be licensed. Period.
