## BC tapes "Live From North Central"

On October 12, the CBC's Sheila Coles and her Morning Edition team descended upon North Central for a live on location look at "Canada's worst neighbourhood" (according to Macleans Magazine) one year later. Greeting Neighbours,

Well the Christmas Season is upon us once again and in the spirit of giving I would like to share this Christmas cake recipe with you. From my family to yours...through every moment of the holidays & New Year may Peace & Happiness be yours.

#### Christmas Cake

- \* 2 (8 ounce) containers candied cherries
- \* 1 (8 ounce) container candied mixed citrus peel
- \* 2 cups raisins
- \* 1 cup dried currants
- \* 1 cup dates, pitted and chopped
- \* 2 (2.25 ounce) packages blanched slivered almonds
- \* 1/2 cup brandy
- \* 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- \* 2 cups all-purpose flour
- \* 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- \* 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- \* 1 teaspoon ground allspice
- \* 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- \* 1/2 teaspoon salt
- \* 1 cup butter
- \* 2 cups packed brown sugar
- \* 6 eggs
- \* 3/4 cup molasses
- \* 3/4 cup apple juice
- 1. In a medium bowl, combine cherries, citrus peel, raisins, currants, dates, and almonds. Stir in brandy; let stand 2 hours, or overnight. Dredge soaked fruit with 1/2 cup flour.
- 2. Preheat oven to 275 degrees F (135 degrees C). Grease an 8x8x3 inch fruit cake pan, line with parchment paper, and grease again. In a small bowl, mix together 2 cups flour, baking soda, cloves, allspice, cinnamon, and salt; set aside.
- 3. In a large bowl, cream butter until light. Gradually blend in brown sugar and eggs. Mix together molasses and apple juice. Beat into butter mixture alternately with flour mixture, making 4 dry and 3 liquid additions. Fold in floured fruit. Turn batter into prepared pan.
- 4. Bake in preheated oven for 3 to 3 1/2 hours, or until a toothpick inserted into the centre of cake comes out clean. Remove from pan, and lift off paper. Cool cake completely, then wrap loosely in waxed paper.

Store in an airtight container.



This past football season, the North Central Community Association partnered with the City of Regina and the Saskatchewan Roughriders. The NCCA hired and trained people from the community to pick up all of the recyclable containers after each Rider home game. The people who worked earned a minimum of \$40.00 per game PLUS a free ticket to watch the game.

This initiative has been a huge success. We have made numerous partnerships with other agencies in the North Central area. Over 100 people worked at least one Rider game, cleaning up the recyclable containers after the games. A huge bonus this year was that the Go Green crew was also able to help out and clean up after the first home playoff game in 18 years!

Though the NCCA coordinated the project, we do not keep any of the money received from the recycling.

Every penny earned is put back into the North Central community. The majority of the money (over

70%) is paid out to the people who clean up after the game. The rest of the money is spent on cleaning up the area around Mosaic Stadium.

We were very lucky to partner with a couple of other groups (the Youth Employment Program as well as the Odd Job Squad through the First Nations Employment Centre). The participants in these programs focused on getting rid of the graffiti in the area around Mosaic Stadium during the months of July and August. Some of the funds from this year will be used to create a mural in the community next Spring.

To that end, we continue to look for people, organizations, and businesses willing to have a mural painted on their property. We are planning to then have an artist work with youth from North Central to assist in creating a vision and a plan, as well as teaching techniques and overseeing the project. It's all very exciting and just keeps growing!!

The NCCA would like to send out a big thank you to each and every person who worked this past season. It's because of you this program is a success and the Riders now have a cleaner North Central to bring the Grey Cup home to. Go Riders! Go Green!

Thank you in particular to Pauline Gabriel who worked tirelessly but never lost her enthusiasm. A large part of the project's success is owed to her!

To celebrate an awesome season (for the Go Green initiative AND the Riders), an appreciation dinner was served on November 29. Thank you to Dianne Songer and Leigh Cote for the wonderful food!

Two Rider players, Dustin Cherniawski and Jocelyn Frenette attended the celebration and brought the Grey Cup with them. Dustin is involved with environmental sustainability and was part of the planning to begin the recycling initiative. He spoke briefly about the impact that the recycling program has on the environment and then everyone was able to have their picture taken with the players and the Grey Cup. It was an awesome evening that won't soon be forgotten by the Rider fans in North Central! Thank you to Karen Mulatz who helped arrange the players' visit. ## Forum provides head start to housing solutions

The North Central Community Association has long recognized there are many issues surrounding the quality of housing in the area. These issues are not limited to the North Central area alone, but because of the age of the houses in the area and the high percentage of rental properties (many of which are affordable for people with lower incomes), the issues are easily seen here.

Recently, the NCCA put together two pieces of research that dealt with housing. First was an overview of some options that exist for regulating landlords and rental properties. Second was a survey conducted of people who rent properties in the North Central area. On November 22, 2007, the NCCA held a community meeting to talk about housing issues. Community members from the Al Ritchie, Core, Cathedral, North East and North Central areas were invited to attend. Twenty-eight people attended the meeting. The majority of people were residents of the community, but some landlords who have property in the area also attended. We were glad to see representation of the landlords at the meeting and look forward to working together on some issues in the near future!

The two pieces of research were briefly reviewed and community members who attended engaged in a process to come up with possible solutions to the housing issues they identified. Each community member then prioritized the most common solutions that were proposed. The results will be used to guide the NCCA's focus when it comes to housing issues.

The top five ideas/solutions that came out of the meeting were:

1) Licensing landlords, 2) Increasing housing rates through Social Services for people living in "good" housing (housing that is physically safe and healthy), 3) Provide more support services for tenants, 4) Put more bylaw officers on the street and have increased enforcement of the bylaws and, 5) Increase the amount of social housing available (some must come with supports for tenants).

Thank you to everyone who attended the meeting. A special thanks goes out to our three facilitators - Brenda Mercer, Ben Webster, and Emmaline Hill, as well as our "scribe" - Jan Morier. You all did wonderful work and it is very much appreciated!

Both pieces of research, as well as a summary of the community meeting, are available through the NCCA office.

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## Travelling the country to fight the war at home

As the President of the Aboriginal Peoples Council of Regina and Chairperson of the NCCA's Ganging Up on Violence Committee, it gives me great pleasure to report to all off-reserve Aboriginal members and residents of North Central of my ongoing activities on the issue of gangs.

As you can see, I wear many hats so before I begin I want to thank the NCCA for their continued support. In addition, I especially want to thank the Congress of Aboriginal Peoples (CAP) National Chief, Patrick Brazeau, for sponsoring me to attend the International Congress on Street Gangs in Montreal back in October.

The only National Aboriginal Organization in attendance at the gathering in Montreal was the CAP. This shows we are serious when it comes to dealing with the issues of gangs and the need to get involved to come up with solutions to this national epidemic.

Sponsored by the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police, the gathering brought together over 500 delegates representing police organizations, national groups, community groups, and experts in the area of gangs from across Canada, the U.S. and the U.K.

One of my main concerns is the problem of Aboriginal gangs in Canada and the ongoing violence that threatens the fabric of Aboriginal society. I'm sad to report that while I was in Montreal I received a call from home that my first cousin, Marvin Daniels, was brutally beaten and killed in Prince Albert. Though the news shook me up, I managed to carry on and speak with a number of individuals who supported the idea of establishing a National Aboriginal Gang Prevention Commission to deal with the issue of Aboriginal gangs in Canada from an Aboriginal perspective.

It was also good to see the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police call for a "National Strategy on Street Gangs" here in Canada, which was announced shortly after the conclusion of the International Congress on Street Gangs in Montreal.

From Montreal I was off to Halifax to attend the 36th Annual General Assembly for the Congress of Aboriginal Peoples of Canada on Nov. 1, 2, 3, 2007. Also representing this community were North Central residents and Métis Elder Stan Klyne, Brian Sinclair and Jadelynn Cappo, also

known as "the Regina delegation."

The highlight of the agenda was an address from the Prime Minister of Canada, Stephen Harper. "The Congress of Aboriginal peoples, in many ways, represents the future of our country," Harper said. "Your membership cannot be forgotten or ignored any longer." Harper added his government has undertaken several initiatives that will benefit Aboriginal people, including legislation to repeal section 67 of the Canadian Human Rights act, \$300 million for Aboriginal offreserve housing, consultations to establish matrimonial real property laws on reserves, a strengthened focus on the Urban Aboriginal Strategy, and implementation of the Indian Residential School Agreement.

CAP National chief Patrick Brazeau said he liked what he heard from Harper. "Those are important elements that were contained in a 7-page detailed letter to the Congress during the last federal election campaign. I am satisfied that the Prime Minister has followed through with his commitments to all Aboriginal peoples."

Also in attendance was the Minister of Indian and Northern Affairs, Chuck Strahl. In his address to CAP delegates, Strahl announced financial resources for CAP's on-going case, Daniels v Queen, which is

seeking to resolve the question of whether Metis and Non-status Indians fall within section 91{24} of the Canadian Constitution act, 1867.

Strahl also announced the establishment of a Canada-CAP Working Group to begin discussions on issues pertaining to Canada's off-reserve Aboriginal population. "This announcement is significant for CAP and for the off-reserve Aboriginal population," Brazeau said. "This is part of our on-going outreach and commitment to work with the federal government to address important issues and to offer accountable, transparent and sustainable solutions for the betterment of our people. We are ready to move beyond the status quo and focus on improving the living conditions of our constituents."

Strahl commended the CAP's efforts. "The Congress of Aboriginal Peoples is about to set new standards of what can be accomplished through strong leadership and a genuine desire to better respond to the needs of the people you serve. I hope other Aboriginal organizations will follow your lead."

CAPrepresentatives then met privately with Prime Minister Harper and Strahl for a 45-minute roundtable discussion. Saskatchewan took the lead role and stressed gang and gang violence is a top priority of our organization.

The third day of the agenda was spent writing resolutions. The Aboriginal Affairs Coalition of Saskatchewan (AACS) position is as follows: CAP and its Provincial affiliates are the social voice of off-reserve Aboriginal People in Canada; CAP and its Provincial affiliates have a moral and social responsibility to off-reserve social issues affecting Aboriginal People in Canada; the issue of gangs and gang violence is the next social catastrophe since the residential school experience. Be it resolved that CAP and its affiliates establish the National Aboriginal Gang Prevention Commission to design a National Aboriginal Gang Prevention Strategy. Be it further resolved that CAP and its affiliates begin immediate negotiations with the Federal Government to seek resources for a National Aboriginal Gang Prevention Coordinator to accomplish such tasks related to a National Aboriginal Gang Prevention Strategy in Canada.

The Creator then grounded us for two days as Hurricane Noel passed through the area, allowing us to get a few days of rest and relaxation. Upon returning to Saskatchewan, I had to bury my cousin Marvin Daniels. We took him home to the Gordons First Nation where he was buried next to his uncle Bill Daniels. May he rest in peace. 
