There were a couple of major changes this past year in the life of the NCCA. Firstly, the move into mâmawêyatitân centre—a beautiful building, a real asset to our Community, in many respects a great facility. But while a 'shared' facility offers convenience to the Community by clustering amenities (macro prospective); that same clustering demands micro management of shared space within. Issues of adequate space, privacy, and competition for meeting facilities present everyday challenges to our Executive Director and staff and must be worked through.

Secondly, last fall we lost the services of our Executive Director to greener pastures. After the receipt of and careful review of proposals from potential candidates, our Board selected Murray Geisbrecht who is ably fulfilling the role. He has come at a time when available funding level of interest and support of its residents. The North Central Community Action Plan, adopted last year, is the template by which the NCCA guides and directs our Community forward. Our Community needs residents who are interested, informed and involved.

After beginning my career with NCCA in 2005, I feel very privileged to return this organization as the Executive Director. July 2017 saw a significant change to our organization as we said goodbye to the Albert Scott Centre, and moved in to our new home at the brand new mâmawêyatitân centre. This new centre is part of a broader vision to serve the North Central community that includes several organizations working together with a focus on the quality of the services they provide for the



community. As an integrated centre much work is underway by the organizations involved to create a unique environment that adds value to how the community is served. NCCA looks forward to playing a key role in contributing to community based programming and services that enhances the lives of North Central Residents.

Over the past few years, there have been significant budget cuts to the non-profit sector throughout the city and province, and NCCA has felt the effects of this, as we have seen a substantial reduction in funding. The next year ahead will undoubtedly be a challenging one. As such we will be looking to leverage partnership opportunities, sponsorships, and fundraising activities whenever possible to sustain our operations.

I am very grateful to the staff at NCCA, specifically Jan, Pauline, Chelsey, Cinda, Christine, Jude, and Donna in working with

me during this period of transition. I greatly appreciate Wendy Dumalski and Bill Ursel from the City of Regina and the team at the Community Services department for their support and being tremendous to work with. And many thanks to our board of directors who are giving of their time, energy, and passion to contribute to the important work of this organization. With determination, dedication, and a willingness to contribute, we can all play an important role in strengthening a community that we can be proud of.

PROGRAM REPORTS

The following are reports from our various community projects and programs from the past year.

Go Green

2017 Marked the 11th year of the program, and the first in the new stadium. GoGreen is a partnership between EVRAZ Place and NCCA. Workers arrive midway through Rider home games (and the occasional additional event), and work or 4-5 hours on average after the events are over picking up garbage and sorting recycling. Workers are given a cash honorarium at the end of the night based on how long it takes to pick up and sort all the recyclables. Most of the income from the program is put back into wages, with the surplus dedicated to murals and other community beautification projects.

Thank you to Premiere Van Lines for providing the truck and driver, SARCAN for working with us and accommodating us, and of course REAL/Evraz for the opportunity to continue our program in the new stadium.

Go Green by the Numbers:

285 workers participated in 10 Rider home games, 3 Rams/Thunder games, 2 concerts, 1 International Soccer game and 2 very long days of shovelling snow.

Average games saw 75-80 people working, with a Labour Day high of 96. A total of more than 4250 work hours paid out.

Just over \$28,000 in recycling was collected. Approx. 202,640 items diverted from landfill.





Renew



The Renew Project was funded by the City of Regina. The purpose of Renew is to engage residents to become active in the cleaning of the neighbourhood. It allows residents to renew their sense of pride in their environment as well as renewing North Central overall.

The Renew Project, when combined with the annual community cleanup, has removed a substantial amount of garbage and recyclable materials from North Central community during the period of a few months. The Annual Community Clean-Up was held on October 15, 2017 in partnership with Bennett-Dunlop Ford.

At 2017's North Central Community Cleanup,

Bennett Dunlop Ford provided 99 volunteers. More hardy folk from the police and fire department pitched in, as did Mayor Michael Fougere and Ward 6 Councillor Joel Murray. North Centrallites came out in the spirit of sharing the labour.

In addition to the numerous volunteers, Bennett Dunlop Ford provided trucks, trailers and large garbage bins to collect the trash. Over the past seven years, Bennett Dunlop Ford has helped collect hundreds of tonnes of garbage and recyclables. A big thanks to Crawfords No Frills for providing food and refreshments for our volunteers.

Community Gardens

The two garden locations at Oasis and Kitchener School were planted by over 100 students from four different local schools, ranging from grades pre-k to grade 11. The North Central Community Gardens continue to be cared for by over 300 North Central residents of all ages, all through the summer. This year the gardens hosted a native plants and tea workshop, where residents were educated about traditional plants and their values; presented by Elder Betty McKenna. The North Central Community Gardens also held canning and preserving workshops, giving the North Central residents the opportunity to learn how to properly preserve and can fruits and vegetables from the gardens.

To celebrate the 10th year of the gardens, the North Central Community Association held a free community BBQ attended by over 300 community members, held at this year's main garden location—Oasis. Having only two locations this year and despite the extremely dry hot weather, the Gardens—with lots of help from the community—still managed to flourish. This year there has been over 150 volunteer hours worked at the gardens; whether it was during drop-in hours, garden events or just people volunteering their time at the gardens throughout the weeks.

In August, 2017, the NC Community Gardens were filmed for an episode ("Gardens Grow Community") of the documentary series *Ageless Gardens*, a visual celebration of gardens and gardeners, with a special emphasis on the role gardens can play in healthy aging. The series aired nationally on Vision TV.

Health Nurse

The North Central Health Services has a history that stretches back over 30 years addressing the health needs of residents of North Central Regina.

Our two Registered Nurses, Jude and Donna, provide outstanding personalized care with warmth and compassion. The primary service is providing low-cost preventative foot care for seniors and diabetics in their homes and in office. The other service is providing health checks (weekly monitoring of blood glucose and pressure), counselling, and referrals for seniors who attend weekly programs at the Albert-Scott Community Centre. The program literally is saving life and limb through preventative care and close monitoring of some of Regina's most venerable populations.

We gratefully acknowledge the ongoing commitment of Saskatchewan Health Authority for their funding support of this vital community service.

Care & Share

NCCA partnered with Chili for Children on a couple of meals including a free elders/seniors lunch for Christmas sponsored by FCC. Our weekly senior's meals and social time runs from Sept to June. We had a great year and survived the transition from the old to the new (building) and look forward to many years in our new home. Heartfelt gratitude to our fantastic volunteers, without whom we would be lost: Pricilla, Tom, Diane, Cosmopolitan Learning Centre, and Forever...in Motion. Special thanks to the CLC for assisting each week with set-up and clean-up.

Income Tax Clinic

The Income Tax Clinic returned in 2018 and was held at the mâmawêyatitân centre. The clinic was held March 13 to April 26, 2018. This we served 288 residents with tax returns. There were 7 volunteers (3 tax filers and 4 greeters). Volunteers contributed a total of 238 hours (145 hours for tax filers and 93 hours for greeters). This service was made possible entirely by our volunteers, and a very special thank you to them for their contributions to what was overall, a smooth and efficient clinic.

VIBE Project

The VIBE program aims to meet the diverse needs of the community and encourage families to become actively involved through various activities. The project offered weekly structured programming and fun-filled activities for the entire family to enjoy.

The VIBE project runs weekly programming that has targeted three categories: Arts & Crafts, Sport & Fitness and Culture. Our programs were created to provide the residents with the option to participate in free recreational programs. The programming offered for the year included: Art and Traditional Crafts, Mitts & Lanyards, Ribbon Dancing, Kids Fitness Circuit, Beginner Power Yoga, Meditation & Visual Techniques, Drawing & Storytelling, Beading, and Self Defence. Vibe also partners with Seven Stones Community School to offer after school drop-in recreational programming.

This past year the Vibe program saw 330 participants, and a total of 1976 visits for the year.

NC Kids Music
